Social Media:

Social media hits continue to grow.

Special events such as Artist of the Month and the current 8x8 Exhibition bring attention to FPG and the Association, while Artist of the Month 'reach' numbers show the power of sharing with friends on the platforms. Those exhibitors who use social media platforms have the most reaches. The 8x8 has attracted nearly 9000 reaches on Facebook and nearly 900 on Instagram, with thanks to Clarence Valley Culture pages covering Plunge events.

In the past month, up until 9th April, there have been 4,400 other Facebook reaches and 354 on Instagram. We now have 864 followers on Facebook and 461 on Instagram. Interestingly, on Instagram 23% of our audience is from Sydney, while only 8% on Facebook. **Suz Monin**

When judging, we looked at how each related to the theme of Small Wonders, the composition of the piece, the use of colour and media as well as originality.

First	24	Patricia Garde	<i>Ellery Creek</i> I was engaged immediately by the restrained use of colour and the sensitive handling of oil on canvas. (Pictured below, with Rosette and Red Sticker.)
Second	6	Robyn Bowden	Baby Aaron Again, very competent handling of oil on canvas creating cosiness and reminding the audience of that sweet baby perfume. Definitely, always a small wonder.
Third	12	Peter Buxton	Gnome Heaven Such mystery and childhood memory are evoked with very competent use of tonal gradations leading us far into the scene.
HC	59	Ally Mead	<i>Ichthyophile's Elysium 2050</i> "What is this?" one asks at first. The title, until I googled it, is a mystery and then slowly the story is revealed. A small wonder, indeed, when one first experiences snorkelling. Very considered construction.
